San Francisco, Oct. 18.—San Francisco has expelled all the Japanese pupils, numbering over 200, from the primary schools. The Japanese residents are exceedingly excited.

ANTI-JAPANESE FEELING IN SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Oct. 19.—The Japanese Consul-General at San

Francisco threatens to appeal to the Federal authorities at Washington, against the strong anti-Japanese feeling displayed by the city authorities.

He has protested against the segregation of school children in the public schools, and feeling runs high on the question.

The superintendent of public education has approved of the segregation plan, by which hundreds of Japanese children are practically debarred from a public school education.

ANTI-JAPANESE MOVEMENT IN SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Oct. 22.—The repeated protest by the Japanese Consul and Japanese Association in San Francisco against the expulsion of their children from the public schools have so far been ignored by the local Educational Council. More than two hundred Japanese school children have been segregated and their parents are quite at a loss as to what to do. The feeling of the Japanese community runs very high, and they are preparing to test the ejection at law. Tomorrow, a mass meeting will be held by Japanese resident here. Messages indicating in detail the public opinion and excitement caused in Japan have been received. The editorial of the *Osaka Asahi* above all, has made an extraordinary impression on the Americans.

The Californian Clergymen's Council, now in session at Oakland, has adopted a resolution denouncing the recent anti-Japanese measures. Telegrams have been received from Washington by the Governor of California, who at once wired instructions to the Mayor of San Francisco.

Persecution of Japanese by Americans is becoming intolerable, and scores of Japanese eating houses will be unable to continue business. Last evening the Togazaki Firm was attacked by a mob and its office partially destroyed. An anti-Japanese movement has also broken out at Los Angeles.
