I have the honor to report for your information

that:

I presented a draft of the statement of facts to constitute an agreed statement for use in future litigation to the Board of Education and their counsel, and late Friday afternoon, December 7, 1906, they submitted certain amendments thereto.

Mr. Richardson, Foreign Secretary of the Japanese Consulate, called at my office and I went over certain statements contained in the proposed amendments by the Board of Education for the purpose of ascertaining if I could agree to them as true. He suggested that he should like to have the Japanese Consul look over these matters.
