Dear Sir:-

It appears from the Newspaper talk that seem to become more and more aggravated every day on account of the disposition of the Japanese Government of the treatment of its subjects in San Francisco, so I thought it would be a good point to inform you if you should not have thought of it, that here in the City of Louisville where 20% to 25% of the population is colored we have separate schools for them. They are all American Citizens and not, as a great many Chinamen who have been imported and some of them perhaps taking advantage of the Schools and not Legal Citizens of this Country. I do not see why The United States Government can be held responsible for the educational regulations of the several States.

If Mr. Chinaman is not satisfied with the Mode and style of living in California he has option to go and locate elsewhere, or establish their own private schools and pay for the education of his Children the same as the Catholic people in this Country do, and who would have more right to complain as they are likewise Taxpayers towards the Public School.

I think if this matter were brought before the Embassadors for attention it would have some good effect, any way if not, it is a very fine argument to use in case war would be declared to show
